LKS2 Curriculum Information for Parents and Pupils Term 2 English Writing skills will focus on the year group Active Reading frameworks, focusing on: composition, text Active reading will allow your child to develop the skills of retrieval, inference and prediction as well as to analyse authorial techniques by organisation, language, spelling, grammatical explicitly discussing language choices and identifying the structural accuracy and editing and refining of initial ideas. Narrative: Alternative versions of traditional organisation of texts and the sentence structures within them. Non-fiction: Recount (newspaper report and Spring 1: Twisted Tales - various diary), non-chronological report about volcanoes Spring 2: The Firework Maker's Daughter - Phillip Pullman Poetry: Rhyming couplets, narrative poetry Maths Following the Mastery in Maths approach, children will develop varied fluency of key mathematical concepts, their ability to reason and solve a variety of problems. Key foci this term include: Key foci this term include: Multiplication and Division Multiplication and division Money Statistics Fractions and decimals Length and Perimeter Fractions Science In this module children will build on their understanding of hearing. They will develop their vocabulary for describing sounds and identify different sound sources. They will learn that sounds are made by something vibrating and that these vibrations travel through a medium to the ear so that we hear them. They will learn that sounds get fainter as the distance from the sound source increases. They will explore ways to change the pitch and volume of sounds. Digestion and food chains In this module children will be introduced to the main body parts associated with the digestive system; the mouth, tongue, teeth, esophagus, stomach, intestines, rectum and anus. They will learn that the role of the digestive system is to break down the food we eat so that the nutrients, energy and other requirements we derive from it can be used in the rest of the body. They will learn about how food can be broken down through mechanical and chemical processes. They will learn in more detail about the roles of the different types of teeth and how to care for their teeth. Computing Systems and Networks Computing In computing, children will develop their understanding of digital devices, with an initial focus on inputs, processes, and outputs. They will begin by comparing digital and non-digital devices, before being introduced to computer networks that include network infrastructure devices like routers and switches. Data and Information - Branching Databases Learners will develop their understanding of what a branching database is and how to create one. They will use yes/no questions to gain an understanding of what attributes are and how to use them to sort groups of objects. They will create physical and on-screen branching databases. Pupils will create dances working individually, with a partner and in small groups, sharing their ideas throughout. They will develop their use of counting and rhythm and incorporate canon, unison, formation and levels in their dances. They will be given the opportunity to perform to others and provide feedback using key terminology. Basketball Pupils will develop the key skills used in Basketball such as defending, attacking, throwing, catching and dribbling, Pupils will learn to use attacking skills to maintain possession of the ball. They will start by playing uneven and then move onto even sided games. Pupils will be encouraged to think about how to use skills, strategies and tactics to outwit the opposition. They will learn how to evaluate their own and others' performances, and how to identify a focus for improvement. **Fitness** Pupils are exposed to a range of activities that explore and develop different areas of their health and fitness. They will learn that being fit means having strong, healthy bodies and more energy for everyday life activities. They will practise various activities using fundamental movement skills, such as running and jumping to improve their strength and fitness. Lacrosse Children will learn to pass, scoop and move with the ball. They will develop their knowledge of team games and learn to intercept a moving ball Volcanoes and Earthquakes

Geography

We will find out about the layers of the earth and tectonic plates and discover where and why volcanoes and earthquakes occur. We will investigate the risks and benefits of living near a natural hazard as well as thinking about the precautions that are taken by those living in earthquake zones.

RE	Beliefs: Practices: Traditions This term we will focus on prayer and special places of worship. We will build our knowledge of why people pray, before exploring different places for prayer; investigating the architecture, and artefacts found in each one. We will discuss the different faith leaders belonging to each religion and discuss the similarities and differences between each faith. We will then move on to focus on Christianity where we will recap what Christians believe, with a focus on the incarnation of God on Earth through Jesus. We will do this through exploring the meaning and traditions of Holy Week as part of the Christian festival of Easter.
Art	Drawing and Sculpture In art, we will develop our sketching skills using different grades of pencils and a range of shading techniques. Our focus will be on feathers and flight, to inspire bird-themed compositions of our own. We will then experiment with manipulating paper to create a 3-D sculpture of a bird
DT	Sewing In Design Technology, children will develop their sewing skills and learn a variety of stitches as part of a Victorian themed sampler:
Life Skilla (PSHE)	'Dreams and Goals' and 'Healthy bodies. Healthy minds' We start the year focusing on learning habits. We will understand how we can be successful and will take pride in celebrating our achievements. To tie in with our science topic, we will consider ways to keep ourselves healthy, both physically and mentally, with a particular focus on nutrition and the benefits of exercise.
Music	During, this term pupils will continue to develop their listening, rhythmic and concentration skills with the emphasis on learning music from a variety of cultures. Year 4 will continue their weekly cello lessons, while Year 3 will begin to learn more notes on the recorder:
French	Petit Chaperon Rouge / Chez Moi This term the children will be learning to sit and listen attentively to a familiar fairy tale (Little Red Riding Hood). They will use picture and word cards to recognise and retain key vocabulary from the stories. They will increase their thinking and reasoning skills in French, identifying strategies to use in the future for memorising new words and phrases.
